

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INTRODUCTION



OF FAITH AND FOOTBALL

I love watching football—American football, to be clear, not the more appropriately named game that actually uses *feet* to advance the ball. I'm in awe of how a seemingly normal human can throw an oblong ball sixty yards to a teammate running Olympianly fast, chased by a third guy determined to stop it all from happening. I'm mesmerized when I see it all come together.

It's easy to picture this scene, after seeing it so many times, and think, "This—this is football; superhumans performing impossible tasks, cheered on by 60,000 wild fans."

We see the moment—the product. What we *don't* see is the father who tossed a ball to his son for the very first time twenty years ago. We don't see the years of training, all the times these athletes chose a salad over a burger, or the late nights studying film. We don't see the coaches, the weight room, or the thousands of times that same play went wrong in practice. Our eyes are fixed on the *product*, not the journey.

It's not hard to see evangelism in the very same way. Just like the word *football* conjures images of screaming fans and touchdown dances, the word *evangelism* makes us picture a specific moment or event—a product. No wonder we get nervous whenever someone mentions sharing the gospel. It's one thing to *know* the basics and a simple method or two, but a completely different thing to regularly *share* what we believe with the people we love in a way that isn't awkward, judgmental, or forced—not to mention how scary it can be! We feel unqualified, ill-equipped, or unworthy, much like I would feel if asked to throw the final pass in the Superbowl.

I've watched these thoughts decimate the motivation and confidence of too many Bible-believing, church-attending, Christ-loving people. One thing is clear: There is a problem with the way many Christians view evangelism—a negative stigma that sends a shiver down our spines and keeps our lips sealed.

But what if we've gotten it wrong? What if I told you

that evangelism is not what we've made it out to be—that the paralyzing fear of awkward conversations or blatant rejection is completely understandable because we've misunderstood something about God's mission to reach the lost?

What if all those who have actively avoided or given up on sharing their faith considered simply putting their helmets back on and showing up for practice? No Superbowl, no audience, just a Cobb salad and some jumping jacks. Well, if that was the case, I think we'd have a few more evangelists on our hands, don't you?

Take you, for instance. By even reading this, you are deciding to take your next step of faith—equipping yourself to join God's mission. You are looking outside the walls of your own personal faith toward others who need to hear the life-changing message of Jesus. You're also responding to the Great Commandment (*Matt.* 22:36-40) and the Great Commission (*Matt.* 28:18-20)—to love the Lord your God with everything you have, to love your neighbor as yourself, and to go make disciples. You're either getting into the game for the very first time or getting back in the game after a few quarters on the bench.

What follows isn't just another method or trick to add to your evangelistic arsenal. It's an outward-focused *worldview* that will have you looking for gospel conversations with anyone, at any time, and anywhere—a fresh lens to help you see yourself and others as God intended.

Without a proper outward-focused worldview, evangelism becomes a task, a product, or a destination. What was

intended as an everyday overflow mutates into an obligatory event—a job rather than a joy.

Instead of focusing on the finish line, let's take some time to understand evangelism on a deeper level, looking at what comes *before* each gospel conversation. Let's develop confidence and boldness in our witness while simultaneously growing closer to God.

On this journey, you will encounter what I like to call the elements of an outward-focused life:

The Gospel—Am I rooted in the gospel?
The Heart—Has my heart been transformed?
The Life—Does my life reflect what I claim to believe?
The Lost—Am I motivated to reach others?
The Gap—Am I hesitant to share the gospel?
The Role—Am I confident in how God uses me?
The Plan—Is my preparation fueled by love?
The Win—Am I celebrating every gospel conversation?

These eight elements work together to strengthen our dependence upon God and propel us toward those who don't know Him. They are the salad, the bench press, and the long hours of practice that help us grow at the right pace, even if it isn't the easiest or quickest. When we see evangelism rightly—as an overflow—and when we take time to develop an outward-focused worldview, we'll find ourselves seeking out gospel conversations because it's who we are, not just what we do.

Thank you from the bottom of my heart for being bold enough to take your next step of faith. Thank you for be-

ginning the journey that will lead you toward a dark world with the light of the gospel. Now grab your helmet because practice just started.

MISSIONAL MOTORS

Our first stop on the road to an outward-focused life is one that many people pass by. Like the gas station three miles out of town, we don't feel the immediate need to fill the tank so we hurry on our way, destination in mind.

I have spent my fair share of time gripping the steering wheel with white knuckles, praying that the Lord would grant me unlimited unleaded because of my absentmindedness, pride, or poor planning. Gasoline seems like a silly thing to forget on a road trip, but I bet you've experienced something similar. Whether it's speeding past a gas station, skipping breakfast before a workout, or staying up all night before an exam, it's easy to discount how crucial *fuel* is in our daily lives. Our fixation on the destination, product, or event distracts us from one of the most foundational pieces of a life on mission.

And so, as we slow down and consider the journey, let's begin by asking: If gasoline fuels our cars and protein fuels our workouts, what fuels evangelism? What keeps our missional motors running? What is the thing that both turns and keeps our focus *outward*, toward those who need Christ? You guessed it: *The Gospel*.

BEST NEWS EVER

The gospel is not a quartet of books in the Bible, it's not a genre of choir music, and it's certainly not a collection of self-help affirmations. The gospel is, quite simply put, the best news we could possibly imagine. In fact, the word *gospel* literally means *good news*. But what is this news?

Author J. Mack Stiles says, "The gospel is the joyful message from God that leads us to salvation." It's news that reminds us of our identity and purpose, helps us make sense of the world around us, and gives us hope for the future.

The gospel both *is* and *isn't* every word in the Bible. Many would argue that the whole Bible communicates the gospel message, and I would agree. Every God-breathed verse is an important thread in the tapestry of God's redemptive

The Win – Am I celebrating every gospel conversation?



These eight elements work together to strengthen our dependence upon God *and* propel us toward the lost. The beautiful thing about this journey is that you don't have to do it alone. Learning, growing, and taking risks for the Kingdom is done most effectively with a mentor, pastor, or trained Always Going GO Leader. GRASPING THE GOSPEL



Evangelism begins long before we open our mouths. It begins in the mind and heart. Before we rush out to share with others, let's spend some time reviewing what we know and how confident we are communicating the gospel message.

At its core, the gospel, or good news, consists of four parts that work in perfect harmony.

Holy God

God has always existed as Father, Son, and Spirit. He is perfect and holy in every way. He didn't need anything but, out of His great love, He created us to rule and enjoy life with Him in the Garden of Eden, paradise on earth. We are the pinnacle of His creation, made in His very image.

Sinful Man

Despite being given all things, including an intimate relationship with God, we weren't satisfied. We wanted more, were deceived into disobeying God, and brought another way into creation that contradicted God's perfect way. We call this way sin, and it's a barrier between us and a loving God.

Perfect Savior

God did not eliminate us, opting to start over. He moved forward with redemption on His mind. God sent His Son, Jesus, to take our place. The payment for sin is death, and Jesus, the only sinless one, willingly gave His life to make a way for us to be adopted into God's family forever.

There are many great ways to share the story of salvation, but the core message is always the same. It's important not to feel locked into one *method* but understand how to share the same *message* in many ways.

This method is called the **Romans Road**—four verses from Romans that communicate the gospel message.

Romans 3:23 – For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.

Romans 6:23 – For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Romans 5:8 – But God demonstrates His own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Romans 10:9 – If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved.

Author J. Mack Stiles uses four often-asked questions that are answered by the gospel:1

- 1. Who is God?
- 2. Why are we in such a mess?
- 3. What did Christ do?
- 4. How can we get back to God?

They say *practice makes perfect*, but let's not shoot for perfection quite yet. How about this? *Practice makes it easier*. The only way to become more comfortable and confident with the gospel message is to practice. Let's spend a little time grasping the gospel.



DISPLAYING DEVOTION



When God changes our hearts, He calls us to shine His light so others might know Him. The way we live shows others what we believe and if we have truly been changed by God. To effectively reach the lost, the heart and life *must* work together in harmony.

What I believe about God determines how I live



How I live my life **reveals** what I believe to others

In his book, *The Cost of Discipleship*, Dietrich Bonhoeffer introduces us to *cheap* and *costly* grace, two views of Christ's sacrifice that lead to radically different lifestyles.

CHEAP GRACE - Accepting God's gift of salvation with no cost to me or the way I live.

"[Cheap] grace is represented as the Church's inexhaustible treasury, from which she showers blessings with generous hands, without asking questions or fixing limits. Grace without price; grace without cost! The essence of grace, we suppose, is that the account has been paid in advance; and, because it has been paid, everything can be had for nothing."¹

"Cheap grace means the justification of sin without the justification of the sinner. Grace alone does everything, they say, and so everything can remain as it was before...² [It] is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance."³

COSTLY GRACE – Understanding the weight and beauty of God's gift and responding with devotion.

"Costly grace is the treasure hidden in the field; for the sake of it a man will gladly go and sell all that he has. It is the pearl of great price to buy which the merchant will sell all his goods. It is the kingly rule of Christ, for whose sake a man will pluck out the eye which causes him to stumble; it is the call of Jesus Christ at which the disciple leaves his nets and follows him."⁴

"Grace is costly because it compels a man to submit to the yoke of Christ and follow him; it is grace because Jesus says: 'My yoke is easy and my burden is light.'"⁵
